## God's Invisible Qualities- By A Simple Seeker

The temperatures are finally starting to cool, school is in full swing, and the fall colors will soon be all around us. This might be the best time of year in New Mexico, and remembering these warm and peaceful days makes it easier to put up with the chilly chaos of the Windy Season every spring. And one of my favorite things to enjoy during the fall is the energetic and sometimes comical presence of the hummingbirds that visit us every year.



If you want to see these fast, feathery creatures up close, put out a feeder. If you really want to get to know hummingbirds, put out more than one feeder. It won't be long until you have a number of these little birds visiting your yard. Then take some time to watch and listen. You'll soon recognize the distinctive buzz-hum of their wings and the rapid-fire chirp of their throats as they race to and fro in your yard. Watch how they feed and fly. It makes me smile.

Beyond the joy of observing their amazing qualities, the tiny flying miracles are clear evidence of a divinely-created world. Their wings beat so fast (50-80 times per second); they can hover, maneuver, and fly in a straight line at over 60 miles per hour. Their bodies – wings, tongues, muscles, and hearts – are designed to function at levels much higher than other birds and yet are remarkably efficient. And even with all of these extraordinary characteristics, some of the smaller hummingbirds weigh less than a dime.

But even at peak efficiency, they need LOTS of fuel to do what they do. If we tried to be a hummingbird, we'd have to consume calories equivalent to more than 1500 veggie burgers and drink over 20 gallons of water a day. And the water would mostly be needed to cool us off when we expended all that energy. If we moved and burned energy at a hummingbirds' level, our hearts would have to beat more than 1000 times a minute, our body temperature would rise to over 700 degrees -- we would burst into flames! If you have time, look up more about the hummingbird. It's well worth it.

What's truly amazing about these creatures, though, is that all of their unique and amazing characteristics (I did not list them all here) must be present simultaneously and altogether. They could not have evolved piece-meal. If any characteristic were missing, the bird would not survive. But God does not make anything that is incomplete or flawed. The hummingbird is a masterpiece of Creation and is a reminder that we serve a loving, all-powerful God who cares for us in even the smallest details of our lives. As Paul wrote: "For since the creation of the world God's invisible qualities—his eternal power and divine nature—have been clearly seen..." (Romans 1:20).

God's eternal power and divine nature is all around us, if we just stop and look for it.
